

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

The house at 13 Hanscom Avenue is a modest 1\%rstory, gablefront cottage constructed in 1928. Distinguishing the building from the many similar dwellings built in the early 20th century is the somewhat unusual pattern of the wood shingles. A double course of shingles is used with an overhang of just an inch or two at the bottom. The house rests on a concrete block foundation. Spanning the gablefront is a single-story, three-bay porch supported by square posts resting on a wood shingled wall. The center entrance is flanked on one side by a pair of windows with an individual window on the other side. The predominant window is a double-hung 6/1 sash with molded surround and outer storm window. A three-sided bay window is located on the south elevation and there is a shed dormer above.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

This house (originally 5 Hanscom Avenue) is located on part of lot 7 of the Edwin C. Hanscom subdivision which was laid out by the local teamster/real estate developer in July 1915 (Plan Book 232, Plan 15). The lot remained unbuilt upon until 1928 when the present house was constructed by or for D.G. Danahy. (No further information was found concerning this individual). According to water department records, the water was turned on April 26, 1928.

By the time of the 1929 street list and 1930 Census, the house was occupied by Otis and Esther Hodgkins. Otis Potter Hodgkins was born in Chelsea on June 17, 1894. The 1930 Census indicates that he was employed as a bookkeeper for a leather company. The house remained in the Hodgkins' ownership until 1977 when it was sold by Esther's estate to Stephen Kowalski.

Constructed in 1928, the house at 13 Hanscom Avenue is a good and well-preserved example of a modest Craftsman gablefront dwelling. The house displays details which are typical of the style including a distinctive wood shingled exterior, square porch posts and 6/1 windows. The property is potentially eligible for the National Register for its associations with the early 20th century development of Reading and as a good example of a variation on the Craftsman style.
